Guidelines for Writing a Basic Academic Paper

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Here's how to write a basic academic paper. These guidelines can also be used when writing an essay, opinion piece, cover letter, or blog entry – in other words, any non-fiction piece of writing that's simpler than a research paper.

1. First Draft

Your paper should have an introduction, 3 or more main points, and a conclusion.

- First, introduce your topic and briefly mention your main points.
- Next, write one or more paragraphs for each main point.
- Finally, write a conclusion. This is very similar to your introduction, but rephrased using different words. This may seem redundant, but that's how this type of writing is done.

2. Second Draft

Edit your paper by doing the following:

- Do a spelling check.
- Look through and make sure when you use the word "I" that it's always capitalized.
- Check that proper nouns (names of people, places, and titles) are capitalized.
- Look for run-on sentences and split them into shorter sentences.
- Make sure each sentence starts with a capital and ends with punctuation (.! or ?).
- Read your paper out loud to see if it makes sense. If something doesn't "sound right," adjust it.

3. Get An Edit

Ask someone else to look over your paper. They should help you with two things:

- First, they should help you correct any remaining spelling or grammar issues. If there are lots of these, they may have you go through step 2 again.
- Next, they should offer suggestions about the content of your paper how to improve it or make it more clear. They should make sure you've covered each of your main points.
- Remember to thank your editor.

4. Final Version

You're almost done!

- If needed, update your paper by making the changes suggested by your editor.
- Go through step 2 again, including reading your paper aloud.
- You're done! Save a copy and then share it with your instructor.
